PCT Long Distance Permit

Most of the PCT does NOT require a permit of any kind. Some parts of the PCT require a permit, which could be the PCT Long Distance Permit **OR** it could be a local permit.

The PCT Long Distance Permit (available on the PCTA website www.pcta.org) makes your life extremely easy because it is an umbrella permit, meaning it covers you for all areas that need a permit — so you don't have to worry if you are in a permit-required area or not. It is a fantastic resource, and I'm glad it exists. BUT it is not, and has never been, required.

Because the PCT Long Distance Permit covers you for your entire thru-hike, it is obviously the easiest option. But it is not the ONLY option! If you can't get a PCT Long Distance Permit, use local permits (see following pages). Using local permits is not cheating!! Local permits were around WAY BEFORE the PCT Long Distance Permit. You can absolutely, positively, legally, hike the PCT using local permits! Hikers have used local permits for decades.

Think of it this way: to board an airplane, you need identification. That could be a Driver's License, State ID, or Passport — each of those gets you on the plane. To hike SOME PARTS of the PCT, you need a permit. That permit could be a local permit or the PCT Long Distance Permit — each of those are valid permits.

The PCT Long Distance Permit is distributed by the PCTA, but it is actually issued by the USFS.

There are two major misconceptions regarding the PCT Long Distance Permit.

FIRST MISCONCEPTION

"The PCT Long Distance Permit is REQUIRED for thru-hikers." THAT IS INCORRECT.

Oh, the blasphemy!! I said that the PCT Long Distance Permit is not required! That is true. However, there are many areas of the PCT where a permit is required. Note that I said "a permit," not "the PCT Long Distance Permit." If a permit is required, you could use a local permit or the PCT Long Distance Permit. Either works.

SECOND MISCONCEPTION

"Hikers do not need any permits if their trip is under 500 miles." THAT IS INCORRECT.

Whether or not a permit is required is determined by WHERE you hike, not by HOW FAR you hike. You could do a 10-mile hike in a permit-required area and you would need a permit. You could do a 600-mile hike in an area which does not require any permits, and you would not need a permit.

I suspect some people think that permits are not required for hikes LESS THAN 500 miles because the PCTA only distributes the PCT Long Distance Permit for hikes GREATER THAN 500 miles. Think of it this way: If a hiker is planning a hike UNDER 500 miles, that hiker IS NOT eligible to apply for the PCT Long Distance Permit. That hiker must figure out if any permits are required for the section of trail they are hiking. The hiker then must contact all the local agencies to obtain individual permits. If a hiker is planning a hike OVER 500 miles, that hiker IS eligible to apply for the PCT Long Distance Permit. The starting and ending locations on your PCT Long Distance Permit can be anyplace on the PCT as long as the total length of your hike is at least 500 miles.

Northbound PCT Long Distance Permits

There are 50 northbound PCT Long Distance Permits issued for starting locations south of Sonora Pass (PCT northbound mile point 1017) for each date from March 1 thru May 31. The 50/day limit encompasses ALL starting locations south of Sonora Pass (for example, if one person starts at the Mexican border, another person starts at Idyllwild, and another person starts at Walker Pass, they have taken 3/50 permits for that day).

35/50 permits per day are issued on a specific date in October/November, the remaining 15/50 permits per day are issued on a specific date in January.

There is NOT a quota for northbound PCT Long Distance Permits with starting locations at or north of Sonora Pass.

In addition to a PCT Long-Distance Permit, **EVERYONE must have a California Campfire Permit.** This is a calendar-year permit, free, available here: https://www.readyforwildfire.org/permits/campfire-permit/

If you have a Mexico to Canada PCT Long Distance Permit (distributed by the PCTA), you do not need ANY of the permits listed below.

NORTHBOUNDERS who do not have a Mexico to Canada PCT Long Distance Permit (distributed by the PCTA) can legally hike from Mexico to Canada using ONLY the permits noted with blue shading below.

Southbound PCT Long Distance Permits

There are 15 southbound PCT Long Distance Permits issued for starting locations north of and including Stehekin WA (PCT southbound mile point 80.7) for each date from June 15 thru July 31. The 15/day limit encompasses ALL four northern starting locations: Canadian Border, Harts Pass, Rainy Pass, and Stehekin (for example, if one person starts at the Canadian Border, another person starts at Harts Pass, and another person starts at Stehekin, they have taken 3/15 permits for that day).

All 15 permits for each day are issued on a specific date in January.

There is NOT a quota for southbound PCT Long Distance Permits with starting locations south of Stehekin WA.

In addition to a PCT Long-Distance Permit, **EVERYONE must have a California Campfire Permit.** This is a calendar-year permit, free, available here: https://www.readyforwildfire.org/permits/campfire-permit/

If you have a Canada to Mexico PCT Long Distance Permit (distributed by the PCTA), you do not need ANY of the permits listed below.

SOUTHBOUNDERS who do not have a Canada to Mexico PCT Long Distance Permit (distributed by the PCTA) can legally hike from Canada to Mexico using ONLY the permits noted with green shading below.

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As stated above, whether or not a permit is required is determined by WHERE you hike, not by HOW FAR you hike. The following pages list, in northbound order, the areas of the PCT where permits are required for hiking or camping.

- Some areas require a permit just to be there.
 It doesn't matter if you're hiking or camping, if you're there, you need a permit.
- Some areas require a permit only for camping/overnight travel.
 If you're hiking thru during the day, you do not need a permit.
- Some permits are non-quota/unlimited.
- Some areas limit the number of permits issued for each day or for a specific trailhead location.
- Some permits are self-issued, meaning there is a kiosk at the trailhead which contains permits. You fill it out, usually attach a portion to your pack and drop a portion in a collection box.
- Some permits are only available at USFS Ranger Stations.
- Some permits are only available online.
- Some permits must be reserved in advance.
- Some permits are available on-the-spot or same-day.
- Some permits are free, some permits have a fee.

This list does NOT address trail closures. There could very well be closed areas that are included on this list. This document simply lists if permits are required or not. Trail closure information is here: https://www.pcta.org/discover-the-trail/closures/

What is "dispersed camping"? "Dispersed camping" refers to the practice of camping anywhere you want.

You see a nice flat spot, you're ready to stop for the day, you set up your shelter or cowboy camp. That's "dispersed camping."

Quoted from the Descanso PCT page on February 1, 2022 https://bit.ly/DescansoPCT: SECTION HIKING (less than 500 miles): For those looking to hike less than 500 miles with a starting point located near or within the Cleveland National Forest, please note the permitting system below. Those without a PCTA long-distance permit looking to disperse camp along the PCT on the Cleveland National Forest must obtain a wilderness visitor permit for the 2022 season. Permits are required March 1, 2022 through May 31, 2022. During non peak months (June-February), a dispersed camping permit is required and can be obtained by contacting the Descanso Ranger District office or by clicking here: https://bit.ly/DescansoPCT2022.

- To obtain a wilderness visitor permit, please fill out the PCT application form https://bit.ly/DescansoPCT2022 and email it to: SM.FS.descansord@usda.gov. Permits will be issued and approved via email by administrative staff at the Alpine District Office. No permit requests will be processed by phone, fax, or mail. Visitors must print the permit and have it with them on the trip.
- Wilderness and visitor permit applications are accepted one month prior to their effective date. For example, a permit application asking for a March 1 start date can be submitted no earlier than February 1st at 12:01 PST. All permit applications are accepted on a first come first served basis. The Descanso Ranger District Office is staffed Monday-Friday. All permits submitted on Saturdays or Sundays will be reviewed on Monday.
- Only one individual can be assigned to each wilderness visitor permit. 5 permits will be issued per day from March 1, 2022 through May 31, 2022.
- Permit holders are required to abide by the start date listed on their permit.
- The wilderness visitor permit is valid for all portions of the Cleveland National Forest: mile 13.5 to mile 53.2 (north of Pioneer Mail Picnic Area), and mile 112.7 to mile 124.8. This permit does not authorize access across non-forest land. There is a 59 mile gap (miles 53 to 112) of non-forest land between the Descanso & Palomar Ranger Districts.

Note the Cleveland NF Descanso Ranger District requires permits for dispersed camping, not for hiking.

You can hike thru this area without the above permit if you stay in established campgrounds or the Laguna Mountain Lodge.

Hiking: San Jacinto Wilderness (federal) and San Jacinto State Park (state) honor each other's free day use permit (i.e. for hiking, not for camping) so visitors only need to obtain one for both federal and state wilderness areas.

Camping: Free in the San Jacinto Wilderness. \$5 per night in the San Jacinto State Park.

San Jacinto Wilderness and San Jacinto State Park permits are self-issued at the Idyllwild Ranger Station. To obtain a permit, northbounders need to hitch into Idyllwild from Paradise Café (PCT mile 151.8).

Day Use Permit, 2021 season: The use of paper day use permits is temporarily suspended in Desolation Wilderness for the 2021 season, due to the current COVID-19 situation. Signs are posted at trailheads with information and regulations. All other regulations still apply.

Overnight Permits, 2021 season: Permits are required year-round for overnight use. Within the quota season (the Friday before Memorial Day to September 30), 100% of the daily quota for overnight permits is available online from 6 months to 1 day in advance of your date of entry at www.recreation.gov. The overnight quota is based upon the number of people entering the wilderness each day, and their first night's destination zone. Permits must be booked at least one day in advance. This means there are NO permits available to book on the day of your visit, as there have been in the past. A phone app is available for booking permits via www.recreation.gov.
